EXTRACT FROM THE ZABR CONSTITUTION

Chapter XVI: Mandate, Duties, and Powers of the Temporary Advisory Council

80. **Establishment of the Temporary Advisory Council:** The Temporary Advisory Council (TAR) is established as a historically cultural and administrative body of the South African Boer Republics (ZABR), authorised by the Declaration of Independence of "100 Men" (12 July 2025), to restore the *Boervolk's* historical international law and protect their cultural, linguistic, and historical identity until a permanent People's Council is elected. The TAR functions in accordance with the principles of the UN Declaration on Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP, 2007) and the white flag process, which emphasises peaceful self-determination.
81. **Mandate:** The mandate of the Temporary Advisory Council stems from the Declaration of Independence of "100 Men" (Appendix J), signed by authorized peoples, and is in line with the goals of the ZABR to promote the sovereignty and cultural heritage of the *Boevolk*. The mandate includes:
- a) Facilitating the appointment of a permanent Volksraad through community participation and the *Volksregister* (Land Record).

- b) Overseeing the ZABR's cultural and administrative activities, including the Population Register and restoration of status process.
- c) Representation of the *Boervolk* in local and international forums to advocate for cultural and territorial rights.
- d) Protection of the Boervolk's Protestant, Afrikaans-speaking heritage, and historical international law (Sand River Convention 1852, Bloemfontein Convention 1854, and *Convention of Friendship, Commerce, and Extradition* with the United States 1871; see Appendix E, Part 1, Point 8).
- e) Preparation of a spiritual and cultural foundation for the ZAB, in alignment with their belief in their Almighty Father.

82. **Duties:** The Temporary Advisory Council is obligated to:

- a) Support the draft ZABR Constitution and, where necessary, prepare for amendments to facilitate the establishment of the Volksraad.
- b) Manage and standardise the Population Register, including the registration of folk consorts and the restoration of status documents.
- c) Maintain transparent communication with the ZAB via platforms such as *Boervolk* Radio and digital channels.
- d) Coordinate community meetings to broaden the mandate of the Declaration, with the goal of collecting 1,000+ signatures for a "People's Affirmation".
- e) Send notices to the Republic of South Africa (RSA), United Nations (UN), African Union (AU), and relevant embassies to affirm the ZABR's cultural and administrative sovereignty.
- f) Protect the *Boervolk's* cultural heritage, language, and traditions through educational and community initiatives.

83. **Powers:** The Temporary Advisory Council has temporary powers, as granted by the ZAB Declaration of Independence (Appendix J) and this draft Constitution, to:

- a) develop cultural and administrative policies that promote the ZAB's self-determination.
- b) Manage and verify the Volksregister and restore status process.
- c) Coordinate diplomatic relations, including sending restoration status notifications to international bodies.
- d) Manage funds and donations for the ZABR's activities, with transparent financial reporting.
- e) Coordinate legal activities, based on natural law and the traditions of the Boervolk, via the People's Court (see Articles 52–54 for judicial power, or as defined later).

- f) Appointing or electing representatives for specific roles, as outlined in the TAR Foundation Charter & Framework.
84. **Structure and Roles:** The Temporary Advisory Council consists of the following roles, as outlined in the TAR Foundation Charter & Framework, to ensure balance and accountability:
- a) **Chairperson:** Lead meetings, keep order, and ensure decisions are in line with the Declaration and draft Constitution.
 - b) **Vice-Chairperson:** Support the Chairperson and act in their absence.
 - c) **Secretary-General:** Managing minutes, administration, and archiving of decisions.
 - d) **Treasurer:** Oversees financial affairs, donations, and funds.
 - e) **Legal Advisor/Legal Coordinator:** Advises on legal matters, natural law, and general principles of law.
 - f) **Communication & Information:** Coordinate publications, notices, and liaison with the Boervolk.
 - g) **Culture & Heritage:** Protect the Culture, Language, and Traditions of the Boervolk.
 - h) **Home Affairs:** Manage certificates, registrations, and community affairs.
 - i) **Peacekeeping Force Coordinator:** Focus on Order, Security, and Community Protection.
 - j) **Youth & Future Generation:** Representing young people and building future leadership.
 - k) **General Representatives:** Serve as advisors and supporters.
85. **Election and Appointment:**
- a) The Temporary Advisory Council was elected on 24 August 2025 at a meeting of persons who took the initiative through a formal voting process and in accordance with the ZAB Declaration of Independence.
 - b) Appointments for specific roles are made by the TAR, with verification by the Population Register, and are recorded in the Appendix/Register of Appointed Representatives.
 - c) Members serve temporarily until the Volksraad is elected.
86. **Transition and Dissolution:**
- a) The Temporary Advisory Council will dissolve once the permanent People's Council is appointed, in accordance with the procedures of the draft ZABR Constitution.
 - b) All records, decisions, and administrative functions will be transferred to the Volksraad upon dissolution.

- c) The Temporary Advisory Council will publish a final report on its activities, including the Population Register and restoration of status process, for international visibility.
- d) Serving Temporary Advisory Council members can assist the People's Council for a 6-month bridging period.

Peaceful Intentions:

The Temporary Advisory Council acts as a cultural and administrative body, in line with the white flag process of the Declaration, to promote the ZAB's self-determination peacefully, without confrontation with the RSA or other states. All activities are aimed at cultural preservation and the restoration of historical rights through legal and diplomatic channels.
